

Learning about Lent

The word **Lent** comes from the Latin word *Quadragesima* which means fortieth. *The celebration of Lent* begins on February 22nd which is known as *Ash Wednesday* and ends 40 days later on Easter Sunday. During Lent, Catholics observe this time as one of preparation for the resurrection of Jesus through prayer, fasting, self-reflection, repentance, and almsgiving. Catholics purposefully 'give something




up' during this time in recognition of the sacrifice that our savior made on the cross for us. Each person receives a blessing in the form of a cross on their forehead that serves as a reminder to turn away from sin. We encourage families to discuss Lent and together decide what to 'give up' or sacrifice during this time. Also, some families decide to include a good deed for another throughout this time. Either way, the value lies in thinking of others. Keep in mind that the best lessons are taught through actions not words.

On Ash Wednesday at 11:20 AM, in symbolism of the commencement of Lent, we will serve students a bread and water lunch in the classrooms. Each student will receive at least 2 pieces of bread (gluten free is available). We also initiate this activity with a prayer service lead by our students on the announcements. Students will get their regular snack at recess on this day. We ask all families to respectfully support this symbolic practice. Please be reassured that no one will starve on this day!

What does handwriting have to do with learning? ~ Source: "The Brain that Changes Itself (Norman Doidge)

In the age of technology it seems like everyone has an opinion on handwriting. So where do <u>you</u> stand in the current educational debate of the relevance, or lack thereof, for children learning to handwrite? Should we be teaching handwriting? Should everyone learn to handwrite or are there exceptions? Is an adult who cannot <u>read</u> handwriting literate or illiterate? If you cannot sign your name are you truly literate? There's more to it than meets the eye. Here is a bit of the history:

For hundreds of years educators recognized that children's brains had to be built up through exercises of increasing difficulty that strengthened brain functions. Up through the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries a classical education often included rote memorization of long poems in foreign languages, which strengthened the auditory memory (hence thinking in language) and an almost fanatical attention to handwriting, which probably helped strengthen motor capacities and thus not only helped handwriting but added speed and fluency to reading and speaking.

Then in the 1960s educators dropped such traditional exercises from the curriculum, because they were too rigid, boring, and "not relevant." But the loss of these drills has been costly; they may have been the only opportunity that many students had to systematically exercise the brain function that gives us fluency and grace with symbols.

In the Lincoln-Douglas debates of 1858 the debaters would comfortably speak for an hour or more without notes, in extended memorized paragraphs; today many of the most learned among us, raised in our most elite schools since the 1960s, prefer the omnipresent PowerPoint presentation – the ultimate compensation for a weak premotor cortex.

So why does your child learn and apply handwriting in grades 3 - 6? We teach handwriting at St. Mary's for the reasons above, and also because the skill of reading handwriting is a component of being a literate person in today's society. Also, this may be the only time your child will learn handwriting in school. However, for some students, it is not appropriate to learn such a skill. Sometimes dysgraphia (extreme difficulty with handwriting) or particular learning disabilities will dictate that learning to handwrite is an exercise in frustration whereby the benefits are outweighed by the challenges. In these situations, we do not insist on a student learning to handwrite.

- 3. Valid Drivers's License: Copy on file at the school
- <u>Valid Criminal Record Check</u> CRC's are processed free of charge when completed online. To complete this process, insert the following link in your browser and follow the directions. <u>https://justice.gov.bc.ca/eCRC/ ACCESS CODE: 8RJ8BJCMYC</u> (Only CRC's processed directly through our school are valid for school purposes).
- <u>Safe Environment Training</u> Sign up at the office if you have not completed this training. The principal usually does SEP training at 8AM. (If you have completed #4 and #5 the school has it on file).

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
